I was looking through the above book and I noticed that there were people sentenced to transportation from Minchinhampton. At a loose end on a miserably wet day, I decided to see if I could find more details than those offered in the book. It developed into a major project and this is the result.

Where I am quoting from newspapers and gaol records I have tried to preserve the spelling and turn of phrase used. This includes the shortening of names, for example William to W<sup>m</sup> or Will<sup>m</sup>, Samuel to Sam<sup>I</sup> etc.

Please note that all information below should be checked in original sources where possible, either the online copies or at the Gloucester Records Office. I'm not infallible and I cannot guarantee there are no mistakes in transcribing the information.

<u>Cheltenham Examiner 15/1/1840</u>: Cheltenham Police Court. John Adams, Mary Ann Jones, Eliza Haines, Elizabeth Barnett and Ann Barnett were charged with breaking open the house of John Brown at Prestbury on Thursday night last [this would be the 9<sup>th</sup>] and stealing therefrom a quantity of wearing apparel of the value of about £40, were remanded until Thursday [that would be the 15<sup>th</sup>] for the purpose of obtaining further evidence.

<u>Cheltenham Examiner 22/1/1840</u>: Cheltenham Police Court. John Adams, Mary Ann Jones, Eliza Haines, Hannah Barnett and Elizabeth Barnett were committed for trial on a charge of stealing a quantity of linen from the premises of John Brown of Prestbury.

Cheltenham Chronicle 23/1/1840: John Adams, Mary Ann Jones, Eliza Haines, Elizabeth Barnett and Ann Barnett, who had been remanded on suspicion of breaking open the premises of John Brown, at Prestbury, and stealing therefrom a quantity of linen and wearing apparel, were brought up for further examination. Elizabeth Brown, laundress, wife of John Brown, deposed that in consequence of information received from her daughter, Mary Hamlet, on Wednesday week, she went to the wash house, where a quantity of wet clothes, entrusted to her care to be washed, had been deposited, the property of various individuals in the parish of Prestbury and elsewhere. The window had been broken open and a quantity of linen stolen. Witness stated that the clothes were safe and the fastenings left secure the night before. Mary Ann Hamlet, on being sworn, stated that she first discovered on Wednesday morning that the robbery had been committed, and that the thieves effected an entrance through the window, the broken glass of which was lying on the ground of the wash house. Witness stated that all the clothes sent to her mother was left secure the night previously, at six o'clock.

In consequence of intelligence received by Brown of the robbery, Elisha Castle traced the property in question to a house in Stanhope Street, in the occupation of Elizabeth Barnett. He saw a quantity of wet linen in various parts of the house on Friday morning, some of which was locked up in a box belonging to Elizabeth Barnett. The articles of clothing were now produced, several of which were identified by Mary Hamlet as the property of different individuals, who had sent them to her other to be cleaned. A pair of stockings belonging to Lady Gresley, and a shirt, which Mary Hamlet could swear as being her husband's, was also found in the house occupied by the old woman, Elizabeth Barnett.

Adams, when asked if he had anything to say in his defence, stated that he lodged at the old woman's house (meaning Elizabeth Barnett) that on Wednesday or Thursday week, he went out with a small dog, and on passing across a field, the animal started a bird that was in the hedge; he followed him, and in stepping over the ditch trod upon a bag, which, on closer inspection he found to contain some wet clothes. He covered the bag over with some grass and thorns, and left it by the side of the ditch. In about two hours afterwards he returned and took it home. On the following morning, when at breakfast, he told his fellow prisoners of the circumstances. They said perhaps the things were stolen and advised him to go and give them to someone, or he might get himself into a hobble. He said he would let them stop for a day or two, and see if any outcry was made, and then he would deliver them up.

Haines said she knew nothing about the things being in the house till Mr Castle came to search the premises.

Ann Barnett said she did not know anything of the transaction till Adams mentioned it at breakfast. The things arrived at their lodgings (E. Barnett's house) on Wednesday night.

The old woman, Elizabeth Barnett, said that she did not see the things brought into her home nor took out. She was up stairs at the time Mr Castle came to examine the house. She prevaricated very much in her

statement, at one time asserting that she was up stairs the first time Castle called and down stairs the second time, she then reversed her statement, being down the first time and up the next. They were all committed on this charge, and a second complaint was preferred against them for stealing a quantity of linen, the property of Charles Parker, from an adjoining wash hose to the one before mentioned. The prisoners were then remanded to Gloucester Gaol till Saturday, when they will be brought up for final examination.

<u>Cheltenham Chronicle 9/4/1840</u>: John Adams, 22, Eliza Haines, 22, Mary Ann Jones, 23, Hannah Barnett, 24, Elizabeth Barnett, 66 and Elizabeth White, were charged, the former with burglarously breaking open the dwelling house of John Brown, at Prestbury, and stealing a large quantity of wearing apparel belonging to different individuals. Adams pleaded guilty. Haines, Jones and Hannah Barnett were acquitted; Elizabeth Barnett & Elizabeth White were found guilty. There was another indictment of a similar nature on the prosecution of Charles Parker; on this also Haines and Jones were acquitted and Hannah & Elizabeth Barnett found guilty. Adams was sentenced to 15years transportation for the first offence and to 7years transportation for the second. Hannah Barnett, 6months hard labour; Elizabeth Barnett 6months hard labour for each offence and Elizabeth White to 12months hard labour.

Tried at the Lent Assizes 31/3/1840 Sentenced to Transportation for 22years. Removed to Penitentiary 6/4/1840. Conduct orderly.

An inquest was held at Mr Wilcox's, New Inn, on Thursday, 29<sup>th</sup> March, before J. F. Sharland, Esq., Coroner, on the body of Joseph Blackwell, found in the River Clyde on Wednesday, the 28<sup>th</sup> inst. It appeared from the evidence that the deceased was seen on the Hamilton Racecourse on Thursday, the 22<sup>nd</sup>, at about 6 o'clock in the evening. He had been drinking. Dr Leach made a post-mortem examination on the body, and gave as his opinion that deceased came to his death from suffocation. Verdict-Found drowned, but not any evidence to show how deceased came into the water.

Whilst in NSW was assigned to Mr J Scott on arrival. Assigned to Mr J Tull in 1833. Assigned to Mr Job Trott in 1835.

Married Ann Timmy (free person) on 3/10/1837

Cheltenham Chronicle Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> July 1829: UNFEELING BURGLARY — on the 9<sup>th</sup> inst. a cottage at Guany Hill near Woodchester, belonging to James Franklin, weaver, was forcibly entered in the daytime, while the whole family were at work, or seeking after it, and by some unfeeling fellows robbed of nearly everything of a portable kind they could lay there hands upon; so that when the poor woman came home, followed by her husband and children, they found their boxes ransacked, themselves deprived of all the clothing they possessed, except what they had on at the time; all the victuals taken from the cupboard and even the mats and old iron stolen. The latter they found in a bag belonging to the thieves, marked No. 1, hidden in an adjoining quarry. Upon making known their loss, the neighbours informed them that two young men named Charles Browning & Chas. Ockford had been seen lounging about there. J. Franklin started next morning to Wotton-under-Edge, whither he had understood they were gone on their way to Bristol. They had pawned part of his clothes in a fictitious name, at eight o'clock, and he arrived at the pawnbroker's about nine, and claimed them. They returned to the neighbourhood instead of going to Bristol, which they pretended, and were apprehended at Nailsworth market on Saturday evening. On Monday, the 19<sup>th</sup>, they were examined before the Rev. P. Hawker, when Ockford was discharged & Browning committed to the county gaol to take his trial.

Light brown hair, dark grey eyes, fair complexion, round face, small short nose, mole upper lip left side. A mole on her right shoulder, a mole under left breast. A scar on her left hip. Mole near corner of left eye. Two small moles left arm, two moles left elbow. Scar on her first finger right hand. Can read and write. (works in) Clothing business. Height 4'11". Tried at the Michaelmas Sessions on 19th October and sentenced to 7years transportation. Removed to Penitentiary 21st October. Conduct: Very bad. Sarah Harrison was charged with same crimes and sentenced the same.

Prison Hulk records: Cannot find any.

Any additional information: From the convictrecords.com.au website and various Newspapers. Mary Ann Browning married Charles Dix (Dicks) 24<sup>th</sup> December 1832 in New Norfolk, Tasmania, and had a son Charles. Mary Ann was granted a free pardon on 19<sup>th</sup> October 1837. When Mary Ann's legal husband Charles Dix was arrested and sentenced to 14 years she took up with John Thomas Haynes, a settler in the New Norfolk area. As 'Mrs Haynes', she and her son Charles Dix sailed to South Australia on the Lady Emma in October 1838. On 8<sup>th</sup> April 1840 she married John Haynes at Holy Trinity Adelaide. On the certificate it noted MAB of Port Adelaide late of Hampton, Glos and JTH of Port Adelaide, late of Battersea. *NB her first husband did not die until 1849*.

She became a publican and had the old Commercial Inn which burnt down in the big fire and eventually the Halfway House Hotel on the Port Road, which still exists.

John Thomas Haynes died in a shipwreck, when his ship Sophia Jane sank bringing seal skins back in September 1844.

She married Edward John Grey on 9<sup>th</sup> August 1845 at St John's Church Adelaide, paying off her debts to the brewery. She later declared bankruptcy and spent time in gaol rather than allow Haynes's English family to claim what she considered was legally and rightfully hers.

Mary Ann died on 12<sup>th</sup> July 1876 at Beverley, Port Road, Adelaide. Her husband died in 1891 and her son Charles (Dix known as Haynes) died in 1898.

At twelve o'clock that night, Mr H. retired to rest, leaving his premises all secure; but on rising at six o'clock next morning, he found that some villains had effected an entrance into the shop, by cutting away part of the shutter, which freed it from the pin by which it was fastened. In this way an aperture was made sufficient to admit one of the gang, who completely gutted one side of the shop, and handed out to his companions pieces of cloth, waistcoating, gown pieces, silk shawls and a variety of other property to the value of £200, with which, for the moment, they effected a safe retreat. On the discovery of the robbery, suspicion seemed at first to be entertained that some parties in the town were concerned in it, and several enquiries were made in consequence; but at length it was recollected that 3 suspicious looking fellows, having with them a horse and covered cart, had been seen lurking about the woods in the neighbourhood, for two or three days previously, and as, upon search, they were no longer to be found, it was justly concluded that they were the depredators. A pursuit was instantly set on foot, but no intelligence was gained of them during the whole of Monday. At a very early hour on Tuesday morning, two persons arrived at Gloucester and called in the aid of Marsh, the police officer, who was directly on the alert, and by nine o'clock on the same morning, two men named Peter Meggett and Robert Evans, having with them the horse and cart and all the stolen property, were secured at the Black Dog, in that city where they had arrived on the preceding evening. The third fellow concerned, a lad named J Rose alias Loveridge, who has before been an inmate of the city prison, contrived to get away before the officers caught sight of him and made his escape in the direction of Tewkesbury. Meggett and Evans, together with the stolen property, were conveyed the same day to Coleford, where an examination took place before PJ Ducarel, Esq. and the prisoners were fully committed to trial.

Humphreys proved having seen the prisoner near his brother's house on the afternoon in question. Betty Hart said that she lived in Tetbury; the prisoner lodged at her house. On the evening of the 18<sup>th</sup> Nov. he came home about seven o'clock in a state of perspiration, and asked if anyone had enquired for him, and then went out and bought a new hat. He showed her a box in which there were eight sovereigns. Witness said she would have nothing to do with them; he had only lodged with her three nights. Charles Phelps, a blacksmith, proved having made a crow-bar for the prisoner in the beginning of November. He was found quilty and sentenced to be transported for life.

The discovery was made by a man living in one of the cottages and information conveyed to Mr Humphrys, auctioneer and estate agent, Stroud, who has the agency of the property, and who immediately sent for Mr King, the active superintendent of police in our district, who accompanied him to the premises, where they discovered that an entrance had been effected by removing a board and wrenching an iron bar out of the window. On discovery of the loss sustained, they immediately set about enquiry, and succeeded in obtaining a clue to the thieves, to whose house they at midnight repaired with two of the rural police, and fortunately brought them to the police station in Stroud on the following morning. It appears that part of the stolen property had been broken up and sold in Bristol but Mr Humphrys sent down a messenger who was well acquainted with the articles and succeeded in obtaining a sufficient quality not so far mutilated but it could be identified for which see police report. It is our opinion that too much praise cannot be given to the individuals who so promptly interested themselves in the discovery of this theft.

Later in same column under Police: Monday, February 24: Henry Smith, of the Box, near Minchinhampton, was charged by Superintendent King, with unlawfully possessing a quantity of woollen yarn and flocks, which he could not satisfactorily account for. Dismissed.

William Bingle, Joseph Smith, (son of the above Henry Smith) John Clarke, and Henry Clarke, all of the Box near Minchinhampton, were apprehended on suspicion of having broken open Dye-house Mills, near Nailsworth, and stolen therefrom a quality of leaden pipe, brass bearings and other property. The prisoners were remanded till tomorrow for further examination on account of the absence of a witness whose evidence would be of material consequences.

<u>Cheltenham Examiner – Wednesday 11 March 1840</u>: Gloucester Assizes sentences include: Joseph Smith, aged 20, John Clarke, aged 14, and Henry Clarke, aged 17, charged with stealing 12lbs of brass, belonging to a mill, the property of W. Ellis Esq. at Minchinhampton. A previous conviction being proved against Joseph Smith, he was sentenced to 7years transportation; John Clarke, 3months hard labour, and to be thrice severely whipped; Henry Clarke acquitted.

Despite the fact that they were intended as places to hold prisoners before they were punished in other ways (primarily by transportation) they constituted a form of punishment in themselves and for a few convicts they were the only form of punishment they experienced before their release. A hulk is a ship that can still float but is incapable of going to sea.

HMS <i>Justitia</i> (formerly <i>Zeeland</i> )	1812–1830	Sheerness	Vice Admiral Richard Onslow seized the Zeeland from the Dutch at Plymouth on 4 March 1796. She was renamed Justitia in 1812 and broken up in 1830, when her name was transferred to the Dolphin.

HMS Warrior	1840–1857	Woolwich	Warrior was a 74-gun ship of the line launched in 1781. She became a receiving ship after 1818, a prison hulk after 1840, and was broken up in 1857.
